## ADVENT - Always An ADVENTURE!

Some new things are happening at SJN this Advent season. We moved into purple and pink as the colors of preparation for the feast of Christmas. Blue violet is still around here and there but not as prominent as before- Advent is still a time of hope but now we join with the universal church in preparing a royal welcome for the King of Kings. The color also reminds us that the Mystery of the Incarnation cannot be separated from the Paschal Mystery of Lent. Penance is also part of the season as

we wait/prepare/ clean ourselves up to receive the Holy Child of Bethlehem. The color is not the important thing. Like always, what's important is what we do with the time.

Another tradition of remembering and waiting is the Jesse Tree. This family tree of Jesus is so named because of the writings of Isaiah who said that "There shall come forth a shoot from the stump of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots." Jesse was the father of King David and you know that Jesus came from the house of David, the royal family of the king. On the branches of the tree today we find symbols that call to mind the "spiritual ancestors of Jesus" from days of old. So beginning with Adam and Eve, we remember some important men and women of the Old Testament who helped us find our way to Jesus.

Some parishioners, under the direction of Jeff Jezerc, have fashioned a beautiful symbol for each of these Old Testament ancestors. Before mass begins on each Sunday in Advent we will call seven of our ancestors' names and add their symbol to the Jesse Tree. After four weeks our tree will reach to Mary and Joseph and finally to Jesus- the star on the tree and our Light for Christmas!

This Jesse Tree helps us to learn our history and the many qualities we build on to make a strong family system. To continue this learning at home, each week our bulletin insert will tell a little about the symbol and give a picture of the symbol that can be deco-

rated and placed on your own Jesse Tree. Of course, the Bible will help us learn more about these Old Testament ancestors so the Bible verses will also be given.

Now we are strong enough to move from our past into our present life with Jesus. So at Christmas, the Jesse tree symbols will be replaced with the symbols of Christ- the Chrismons (monograms of Christ's name). Again a page of symbols will be provided so we can all celebrate Christmas with a Chrismon Tree. White lights and stars also decorate the Christmas tree in honor of Christ- the Light of the World.

Colors and activities are important to this holy season but still prayer has the most important place. A very beautiful TAIZE prayer experience is planned for Friday, December 2 at 7 PM.

Music and chant and wonderful Scripture readings will lead us to benediction and adoration to prepare a special dwelling place for Christ to be born in our hearts this year.

The community centers on prayer. Come and help us honor Christ as the center of SJN.

Don't forget to check out the multitude of Advent resources available in the lobby. Select something for yourself, your family, special children in your life and maybe even neighbors and friends. Advent is a time to prepare. Good preparation always makes the celebration a treasure for all. Let's do it together this year. Make it an Adventure to remember!

# Lifeline Moments

Thank God that His saving love surrounds us day in and day out. I'm so certain of it that I tend to take it for granted. Then I am reminded through a moment of grace that reveals the life line that God extends to us. In this lifeline of SACRAMENT His lovepower is so evident that the whole community rejoices with me. We celebrate Baptism as the first lifeline. God reassures us that we are family and nothing can ever separate us from His love. Bathed and beautiful, we are claimed for Christ. All of us cherished as we are anointed, clothed and named. Sharing in the very Light of Christ we are empowered to live a life worthy of this family of the Father. It's not just a baptismal date but a call to hold on and live always in family and love.

We know these important parts of Baptism from when we studied them awhile ago or prepared for a baptism. Sometimes we start to forget the importance-the living parts-and only concentrate on what we see in the sacrament.

Yet in spite of us, each sacrament can

awaken us to God's richness and care. Most of the seven we may have celebrated. Now time has gone by and we have an opportunity to REFLECT on these sacrament moments. Time has been given to go deeper and deeper into the mystery of a lifeline held out to us at a time of birth/belonging (Baptism), a time of nourishment (Eucharist), a time of forgiveness (Penance), a time of sickness (Anointing), a time of confirming growth (Confirmation), and a time of discerning our vocation-our daily work through Matrimony or Holy Orders. All of these important times become SACRAMENT when celebrated in Christ's community of faith.

Maybe it's time to reconnect the lifelines in your life and in our church. Spend five Friday mornings, February 3 to March 2 from 9 AM until noon, at St. John Neumann. Listen as Fr Al leads us through discussion, story, reflection and ritual to a new awareness of God's all surrounding love in our critical moments of this life journey. # And the Last Shall be (as Good as the) First

**F**ive kids, five First Communions. By the time I got to the last, I had seen and heard it all. Attend another class on First Communion? I could teach the class, for cryin' out loud.

Or so you would think...

What I discovered when I arrived for our First Communion/ First Reconciliation Parent meeting is the importance of our role as Parents in making this day special in a way that goes far beyond the new clothes and Communion parties. You see, the 'event' is the culmination of the 'getting to know you' process between your child and Jesus:

As usual, the Shepherd has already done his part by calling us by name from the very start. He extends his hand and words of introduction in the stories of the new testament. We,

as parents, have to put voice to those words for our children.

Your child gets to know Jesus personally through prayer. We, as parents, have to make introductions and sometimes help get the conversation going by praying with them. We also set the example of prayer in our daily lives.

In Reconciliation, our child can share their 'secrets', which of course only happens between the best of friends. We have to help to nurture that trust, and help them understand that as a friend, the Shepherd doesn't judge us, but only forgives. We sometimes have to demonstrate that type of forgiveness so that they know what it feels like.

Finally, they get to meet Him in the flesh. He becomes part of them and they become part of His Body. We help to build the excitement of this encounter as we talk of what the Eucharist means to us, and demonstrate this each week as we receive Him.

I am kind of embarrassed to say that despite having done this four times before, I didn't walk into that First Communion meeting with these

insights, or with this understanding of my role. I wasn't handed them on a sheet of paper when I arrived, either. It was only through the EXPERIENCE of praying and listening and reflecting with other parents that I came to this understanding. We also got a lot of practical ideas for ways to live up to our end of the bargain from Barb Stokes, who after 40 years of sacrament preparation, is quite decidedly the best resource you could find. Her approach makes things clear and understandable and leaves you with a desire to make this time very special for your child. Somehow, each time, there is an opportunity to deepen your understanding.

Makes me wish I had a few more children to go through the process.....OK I won't go that far, but hopefully you get the point. Let's set the example of the importance of Eucharist in our lives by setting aside the time to carefully consider our role in making First Reconciliation and First Communion the wonderful step in a relationship with Jesus that they should be for our children.

## Toddler Time

Sometimes you just need to have some time with another adult as you experience the wonder of toddlers and young children. Sometimes it is just nice to have a big empty warm place for little ones to play during the winter months. Sometimes good ideas grow into delightful friendships.

To work on these "sometimes" we are beginning two meeting times for any parents and little ones (birth to age 4ish) who want to come together. Coffee will be on and the Youth Room open for all on WEDNESDAY, November 16 and/or SATURDAY, November 19 from 10am till we need to go home! ## An Update and a New Ministry

My name is Rick Caruso and I am a candidate for the Permanent Diaconate in the Diocese of Pittsburgh.

I wanted to first thank all of you for your support and for your prayers as I enter my fourth year of study in this program.

Since I last wrote, I have attended a 5-week course on the Letters of St. Paul and am in the midst of a 7-week course on Catholic Moral Theology. I have learned so very much about my faith and about the Catholic church. What a privilege to be considered by the Diocese as a person, charged in special way, to deliver this Good News to others.

In addition to class work, I have attended Days of Reflection whose focus has been on the church's teaching regarding Reproductive technologies (Hormone therapy, In vitro Fertilization), End-of-Life issues (Euthanasia), and Human Sexuality (Natural Family Plan-

ning and Contraception). The content of these days has given me a great deal of content for reflection and personal as well as spiritual growth.

If you read my article from last month's Insights, you'll recall that my summer assignment was at the Allegheny County Jail (ACJ).

What a blessing that experience was for me as I had the privilege of serving those inmates and bringing Christ to them through the sharing of time and the teaching of the faith. I learned a new appreciation for the power of an addiction, be it alcohol, drugs, gambling, or sex. Please pray for these men and women that God will give them the strength that they need to move their lives forward in a positive way.

Finally, to the title of this article. On September 18th, 2011, I was instituted by Bishop Zubik to the Ministry of Acolyte. The General Instruction of the Ro-

man Missal defines the responsibilities of an Acolyte. They include all those actions that are typically done by Altar Servers, distribution of Holy Communion, and following communion, the Purification of the sacred vessels. As I serve in this new capacity, there is a reverence for and a self-recognition of my actions which I, at times, fail to achieve. I become concerned about the mechanics of my actions than the awesomeness of what I am doing. I remain confident that with prayer and God's grace, that I will serve Him more faithfully in the future.

I am richly blessed to have a family, my wife Carol, and my two daughters, Anne and Gina, who continue to support me in my faith journey.

# Great Service Comes From the Heart

There are about 12 groups who travel to Preston County, WV to participate in the Summer Home Repair Program, but the SJN group is unique. What makes us unique is our ability to fundraise. Most groups are from parishes supporting schools, a combination of parishes and schools or they choose not to. Consequently, they have a limited budget which puts constraints on what can be accomplished.

We have some very talented people in our group; from Paul Hlasnik, our construction manager, who runs his own construction company and Mike Hebor, who does commercial construction, to a number of talented weekend warriors. The rest of us are eager to learn and help in any way. But the most important gift this group brings to West Virginia is its heart.

This summer we met Neoma. She had two wishes- to have her trailer painted and to have a bigger front porch. She had a large family and they tended to congregate at mom's. We made our plans based on our site visit in early May. When we arrived in late June, we learned that Neoma was terminally ill. We were faced with a big decision. Should we scale back our project? None of us had the heart to do that. In fact, the porch actually increased in size just a little. This may have not made sense from a dollar and cents prospective, but it did from the heart. The joy received from the finished project was immeasurable. It made a difficult time just a little easier for this family who said that their mother had never had anything this nice in her whole life. She died in September, but the trailer will now be home to another family who will enjoy the added living space.

You made that joy possible by supporting our efforts. Our budget is over \$45,000 each year of which \$20,000-\$25,000 goes toward building materi-

als. We attempt to fundraise at least half of that amount. When you come to our Wine Dinner, Art Auction, buy an Enjoy or Entertainment coupon book, or donate or buy from our two garage sales, you help us go the extra mile. Your additional tax deductible donations are also a blessing.

In addition to these events, which we hope provide social gatherings for the parish and a service to help you recycle your unneeded household items, each member donates \$300 to help defray the cost of accommodations at the 4H Camp, food and rental vehicles.

Our ability to fundraise isn't the only thing which makes us different. Our members go out of their way to try

and make a memory for our families. Alanna Foran painted unique house numbers to compliment Neoma's newly painted house and the crew painted her picnic table to match. Shirley's toilet developed a leak. It wasn't on our list, but the leak was fixed and she received a new toilet and vanity.

So far, two extra trips in the months following our week in June have occurred to finish work that either was added on or we didn't quite finish. One more is likely in the spring. We take our commitments seriously and finish all work promised.

We thank you for helping us achieve our goal of great service from the heart. We couldn't do it without you.

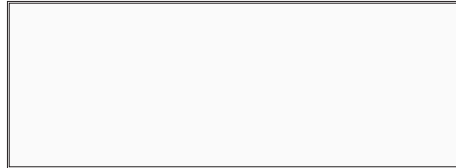
## *The Immaculate Conception*

During this past summer a parishioner from St John Neumann was doing some work in Africa and had a painting of the Blessed Virgin Mary commissioned by an artist she worked with. We had the painting framed and will be placing it into the Narthex of the church on the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, December 8. Since the anticipated Mass for this feast falls on a Wednesday this year and our new program with the Good Shepherd Religious Education has Masses at 4:30 and 6:30, we will keep that schedule for the eve of the Holy day. Before each of those Masses we will have a small blessing service around the new painting, then all process into the Church together to begin the Liturgy. We hope this addition to the Church will be well received and appreciated by all.

“To welcome the graces that the Feast of the Immaculate Conception brings, we ask you to recall the words in the Book of Genesis: “The Lord God then called to the man and asked him, ‘Where are you?’ He answered, ‘I heard you in the garden; but I was afraid, because I was naked, so I hid myself’ (Gen 3: 9-10). Sin affects us. We often think that we can avoid the unhappy effects of sin by convincing ourselves that what is wrong is right. This strategy never frees us from sin. Such useless rationalizations only force us to try and hide from God. When we try that, we sink more deeply into sin. In order to break this vicious cycle of sinning, God sanctified Mary in a way altogether unique. We call this grace her Immaculate Conception. Because she is conceived without sin, Mary shares beforehand in the merits of her Son's sacrifice. Since she has been given to us as our spiritual mother, Mary communicates to us her holiness. So we say in the Hail Mary, “pray for us sinners.” This means that we no longer need to look for a place to hide from God (which is impossible to find in any case).”
